<u>Uniform:</u>

I wish to again thank all our families for their support and cooperation with our Uniform Policy. At St Joseph's we have clear uniform requirements, and its main purpose is to develop in students a sense of identity within our community, to present a positive image of St Joseph's to the wider community and to create a level of consistency and equity for all students.

Some general points to remember include:

- Appropriate school shoes are required All Black Sandshoes or Predominantly White Sandshoes on the appropriate days.
- Hair should be neat, tidy and tied back if longer than shoulder length with appropriate school coloured hair ties. No extreme haircuts.
- No hat, no play policy.
- No fingernail polish.

We thank all parents and students for their support, cooperation and understanding. We are all very proud of our uniform which has a very important role to play in the overall makeup of our fantastic school. Thank you to Yates Menswear for being our supplier.

Child Safety—Drop Off & Pick Up:

We thank all Parents/Carers who are following the start and end of the day procedures when dropping off or picking up their children. The morning routine is working well, with the 'Kiss and Drop', and our dismissal structure is working well with R-2 students meeting under the shelter. The safety and wellbeing of our children is a priority and we provide the following points:

- Please show patience and care when in the line of Kiss and Drop.
- Pull in when there is a space at the end of the line, and move up as far as possible in the designated area.
- Parents remain in the car whilst students get out staff will be there to help if needed.
- When leaving the area please do not pull out in front of the car that is in front of you. Wait for your turn to move off.

- There is NO parking in the Kiss and Drop zone.
- Remember the speed limit when approaching the crossing—25km/hr (this should apply to all areas around the school).
- Staff supervision starts at 8.30am. Students should not arrive prior as there is no supervision for them.
- Cars should not stop at intersections or crossings to collect children.
- Please avoid parking in laneways and across residents' driveways.
- A phone call is appreciated if you are running late for collection at 3.15pm.
- Parents and caregivers are encouraged to park their vehicle and come to the collection points to collect their child/children.
- Use the 'flagged' road crossings at all times to cross the road appropriately.

Leadership:

We have again had a very strong emphasis on leadership and how all students across the school can demonstrate specific skills and attributes such as, manners, responsibility, care and respect. The Year 6 students have worked through a specific Leadership Program that has included many activities to learn about the dimensions and skills around leadership. They have discussed responsibility, being role models, decision making and selflessness. The students learnt about the expectations and processes that leaders go through as a part of their daily lives. They will finish by selecting the leadership roles for 2024 including School Captains and House Captains. We will have a special Leadership Induction Ceremony on Friday 16th February at 9.15am where we will present and congratulate all our Captains and Class SRC representatives.

Sacramental Dates:





Analysing student data to inform teaching and learning is pivotal in determining the zone of proximity. Students have completed beginning of year assessments to inform teachers of the required 'next steps' in learning when crafting their classes curriculum for the term, aligned with Version 9 of the Australian Curriculum. Exciting subject learning is evident in all classrooms with student's engaged and challenged to achieve goals.

Student Wellbeing:

Nude Food and Nutritious Lunch Boxes

Eating a nutritious, balanced diet, fuels our bodies so we have enough energy to go about our everyday lives and participate in all the activities we love to do. Not only are we fuelling our bodies, but our brains as well. This can help improve students' ability to focus in class, and therefore, learn and interact with their peers in a positive way, and is important to both their physical, and mental, health too. We understand that each child is different and has their own preferences for food, and packing lunchboxes can be overwhelming for the parent/carer! It is important to include foods that you know your child is familiar with and will eat. Including them in the process and asking them what they would be willing to try is a good way to expose them to new foods. In your communication pockets we have included a resource with some suggestions for packing a nutritious lunchbox, and with minimal impact on the environment.

In Week 5, we will be holding a 'Be Green' day to align with Clean Up Australia Day. Last year, our waste bill was over \$8000. Our aim this year is to reduce the number of red bins that go out each week by raising awareness about caring for our environment and reducing the amount of waste that we bring to school each day.

We encourage students to bring nude food lunch boxes. We use the term 'nude food' at St Joseph's but what does the term 'nude food' mean? Nude food is a part of the trend in reducing single use plastic, foil containers or wrapping by using washable containers or bees wax food wraps to help reduce the amount of rubbish being brought to school and going into landfill.

We can all make a difference, if we look after our environment, we can also look after students' growing minds and bodies! There are many ways to pack an interesting nude food lunch box which has zero impact on the environment.
