Merry Christmas:

As we enter the Christmas season, we hope that all our families have a safe and happy time and remember what Christmas is all about. In this time of consumerism and personal greed, it is important that we reflect on the original Christmas story. And not the one that we see on glossy Christmas cards and stylised artworks and re-enactments. The two Gospel stories that tell of the birth of Jesus have very different accounts. One has shepherds, one does not. One has some 'wise' men (maybe not 3 of them?) who visit Jesus in a house, but the other does not. None of them mention any animals in the 'stable', or even a stable, only that Jesus was laid in a manger, an animals' feeding trough. Our combined, and probably, watered-down idea of the birth of Jesus is different from the two versions portrayed in the Bible. But it doesn't change the meaning of the story-that two thousand years ago a child was born to a young girl in a land a long way away, and that child went on to become the person we know as Jesus. The same person who changed the world and influenced billions of people around the world to share his story, his beliefs and his love. As we open presents on Christmas morning, are we thinking about that child born a long time ago, or are we thinking of ourselves? Hopefully we are thinking of both. Hopefully we are thinking of how connected we are to our God
