EMPATHY

This weeks school value is empathy What is empathy?

Empathy is the ability to share someone else's feelings or experiences by imagining what it would be like to be in that person's situation.

Empathy can be defined as the ability to sense other people's emotions, coupled with the ability to imagine what someone else might be thinking or feeling. Having a great deal of empathy makes you concerned for the wellbeing and happiness of others.

Why is empathy important in life?

Empathy is an important ability for all people to have. It helps us to understand and relate to people from all walks of life. It improves your capacity to communicate with others, to be part of a team and to better your leadership skills.


How can we teach empathy?

Empathy builds on the ability to see things from another person's point of view, which most children acquire at around the age of four or five. But being fully empathetic also means being able to regulate your own emotional responses, care about how others feel, understand what they need and respect views, even if they're different from our own.

Some tips for practising empathy:

Because empathy is, fortunately, a skill that can be learned and strengthened, there are many ways we can encourage children (and adults) to practise being empathetic. You can:

- •work on listening to people without interrupting.
- •pay attention to body language and others of non-verbal communication.
- •try to understand people, even if you don't agree with them.
- •ask people questions to learn more about them and their lives instead of talking about yourself.
- •imagine yourself in another person's shoes.


